Special feature: UNESCO debates every Thursday

USPs:

- Lessons are relevant to the modern world; involving topics which are increasingly relevant in our students' lives
- A course which aims to push students to think critically; looking at the world and issues in a variety of ways, and take on points of view which aren't necessarily their own
- A course with a focus on creativity; getting students creating content to deadlines in a variety of formats
- A course with a huge focus on collaboration. All lessons aim to maximise speaking and leverage the multicultural nature of the classes
- A course which prepares students to stand up in front of an audience and present ideas and debate
- Weekly themes which give purpose to learning, so students can see why they are studying content, and how themes relate to bigger pictures. This also gives students a change to recycle and apply their language in a variety of formats
- Gamified learning to motivate students to perform. Work may result in gaining territory in a civilization game, earning social credit points in the dystopian week, or contributing to your overall budget for the summer festival
